Ninebark (i.e., Summer Wine and Diabolo, burgundy foliage, white and pink flowers, dramatic bark)

Arborvitae (Good windbreak plant, up to 25 ft tall X 8 ft wide, i.e. Ember Waves Western Arborvitae **provides color changes throughout year).**

Crape Myrtles (Full sun, low water once established, 15 ft tall, i.e. Catawba Crape Myrtle, may bloom more than once during the summer, curb appeal)

One Seed Juniper (juniperus monosperma, a small shrub/tree growing up to 21 ft., a plant localized to New Mexico's 3000 to 7000 ft elevation, attracts Cedar Waxwing birds in the early Spring to eat the berries and insects in your garden, seeds can be purchased on Amazon or dig one up on rocky soil). Other varieties to consider-New Mexico Cedar and Cherrystone Juniper.
