

NMJC Turnitin Canvas Tutorial

This tutorial demonstrates accessing your originality report and feedback from your professor through the Turnitin.com integration in Canvas.

1. Click on Assignments in the course menu on the left of the screen, or click on the assignment in the learning module index.



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4. Click on the turnitin.com originality report icon. The color of the icon and the number on the icon depend on the content of your originality report.

7. The first passage is not enclosed in quotation marks and has no citation. The author has used source material and not cited it. Based on one or more passages like this in a paper, the professor will likely take action according to the policies in the course syllabus.

8. The second, purple passage is enclosed in quotation marks. Also, a citation occurs right after the quoted material, and a bibliographic entry occurs for the source at the end of the paper. Even though turnitin has highlighted this passage, the student is in good shape because the material is quoted and cited. **Be sure to cite all paraphrased and quoted material from all sources.**
9. Turnitin may also occasionally flag commonly used phrases like clichés or the titles of books. If turnitin.com highlights a few, isolated words, there is no reason for concern.

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- Once you are finished reviewing your originality report, click the Grademark button on the menu at the top of the screen.

It is necessary for students to think outside of the box. Routine thinking is boring and undesirable. According to John Taylor Gatto, "School didn't have to train kids to think they should consume nonstop; it simply taught them not to think at all" (23).



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11. Place your mouse over each of the blue highlight boxes to read each comment your professor has made on your assignment.



12. Your professor may highlight passages of the paper to show you that a comment applies to the highlighted area. The highlighted passage may or may not be the same as the passages highlighted on the originality report. A professor may highlight passages for reasons other than pointing out originality.

13. Your professor may also strike words, phrases, or passages with a red line to indicate the text should be deleted.

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14. Scroll through the entire paper, mousing over each blue box to make sure you have received all of your feedback.
15. Your professor may also leave some summary comments in the pane on the right side of the screen.
16. If your professor uses a rubric to grade, click the rubric button in the bottom right of the screen.
